
# ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

What can one say? Well, if we are talking about Cliff Halliday, a lot.

#### **Featured Plant**

GARRYA, elliptica, Coast Silktassel

Agenus of about 13 evergreen shrubs with leathery leaves and long, slender, silky catkins. Garryas are excellent for growing in coastal sites. They thrive in all types of well-drained soil but need protection from cold winds. Prune only to remove dead wood. This male Garrya is a large shrub or small tree, draped during the end of winter with long, grayish green catkins. Introduced in 1828 by David Douglas.

It is located in the North Border (left side) just above the Sunken Garden. A companion plant in the same location is Viburnum x bodnantense 'Dawn' with lovely pink blossoms which is flowering along side of the Garrya.

Both wonderful winter additions.
