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## SEPTEMBER 1 - 8 A NEW BRIDGE IS BEING BUILT IN THE PARK

Come and watch a new bridge being built in the park September 1 - 8, 2018. This new stone bridge will be constructed over the brook at the top of the recently renovated rhododendron ravine. As far as we know this will be the first dry-stone bridge west of Ontario.

Dry stone masonry is a technique that has been used for millenia. No mortar holds the rocks together, only gravity and friction. The skill of the stone mason is an essential ingredient in the success of the structure.

The project will be carried out by *Dry Stone Walling Across Canada* as an eight-day workshop for stone masons wanting to learn about building with stone and without mortar. They will build a traditional style Scottish packhorse footbridge that will be 5 metres long (16 feet), just over a metre wide (4 feet), and will have a 2.3 metre span (8 feet). Local quarried rock and field stone will be used.

Construction will take place from September 1 to 8, 2018.

You are invited to come to Dominion Brook Park and watch these skilled craftsmen at work. On Saturday, September 8, at 2:00 p.m., a dedication ceremony will take place to celebrate the completed bridge. The main event will be the removal of the wooden centring form.

## FEATURED PLANT

RHODODENDRON MUCRONATUM, var. sekidera

Aplanting plan is being developed for the restored Rhododendron Ravine. The next series of featured plants will focus on some that are already purchased and will be planted this fall.

Our Sekidera was purchased this spring at Evelyn Weeges' plant sale – her last sale ever. The Weejes' garden in Deep Cove and their contribution to rhododendron development are well known to rhododendron enthusiasts.

The Sekidera is a mid-season rhodo. The flower is single, funnel-shaped, white with spotted dorsal lobes that are splashed rose color. It is about 2" across and fragrant. The rhodo's origins are uncertain. Once considered to be a species, some now believe it is a hybrid from southern Japan.
