The District of North Saanich continues to support our work by having at least one employee on site with us, mowing, edging, filling watering bags, removing the green waste that we produce, and doing any heavy lifting as required.

Rock Wall Workshop October 2020

Last fall the Friends of Dominion Brook Park partnered with Rocks and Stones Masonry for a weekend dry stone wall building workshop. In less than two days we built the wall that flanks the south side of the stone bridge. The workshop was such a success that we hope to repeat it this October 3 and 4. Financial Matters 2019 in Review

For the first time since the creation of the Friends of Dominion Brook Park Society we are unable to hold an Annual General Meeting. We still want you, our members, to know our financial position and what we accomplished in 2019.

We began our year with a bank balance of \$7,700. During the year we raised \$10,100 and spent 7,500, ending the year with \$10,300 in our bank account.

Our income was comprised of our \$2,500 Grant in Aid from the District of North Saanich. A \$1,500 grant from the Saanich Peninsula Community Foundation was used to help fund the landscaping plan developed for the ravine. Membership dues accounted for \$1,300 and we received \$4,000 in donations and \$800 from GST rebates and interest.

Park maintenance, supplies and volunteer expenses totaled \$1,700 and administration and were miscellaneous expenses \$700. Our largest expenses, totaling \$5,100, were for tree work and ornamental pruning; the detailed planting plan for the rhododendron ravine; and the dry stone walling workshop held in October. Donations from the workshop participants paid for the cost of the instruction.

With its mix of open spaces, shrubs, mature trees and water, Dominion Brook Park is an ideal place to spot a wide variety of local resident and seasonal birds, from birds of prey to song birds. Here is a list of birds seen and heard in the Park recently. This is just a sample of what you can see when you stop, listen and look among the branches and in the sky above the Park.

Red tailed Hawk, Great Horned Owl, Turkey Vulture, Anna's Hummingbird, Rufous Hummingbird, Hairy Woodpecker, Crow, Barn Swallow, Chestnut-backed Chickadee, Red Breasted Nuthatch, Bewick's Wren, Pacific Wren, Golden-crowned Kinglet, American Robin, Western Tanager, Song Sparrow, Whitecrowned Sparrow, Oregon Junco, House Finch, American Goldfinch, House Sparrow.

2020: The Year Ahead

In previous years our volunteers got into the Park in mid-March but this year following District and Provincial guidelines we delayed until early June. Our volunteers are now hard at work on Wednesday mornings weeding, raking and dead-heading, at a social distance of course. As you can imagine, given the late start, our focus

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is on clean-up, including the ravine.

Now that we have a detailed planting plan in place for the rhododendron ravine we are anxious to begin the next steps. The plan is divided into 15 zones and we will proceed zone by zone with site preparation and then planting. But before planting can begin we'll need help from the District to get water into the ravine so that we can irrigate any new plantings. This is in the works. We also need to remove a couple of maples in the ravine and to that end a contract has been awarded: the work will proceed this summer. If all goes well we may see our first planting as early as this fall.





Featured Plant: Ginkgo biloba Variegata

Also known as the Maidenhair tree, this is an unusual Ginkgo cultivar with fan-shaped leaves that are striped, creamy-white and green. Each leaf can be different in colour, two-tone, all white or revert to green. The foliage turns golden-yellow in the fall.

The Park specimen is relatively new (2018) and still quite small but will grow to ten feet in height with an eight-foot spread. You can find it on the north border of the Park near the fence in the north east corner of the Park.
